ERN Activities

ERN has supported resettlement in Europe through:

- Building a network of close to 4,000 (including SHARE 1.200 local and regional actors) resettlement actors: Governments, International Organisations, local actors and civil society in 28 EU countries and beyond.
- 'Tailor-made' capacity building, thematic best practice exchange (regional, national, local) and targeted training in new and emerging resettlement countries (in cooperation with SHARE: linking pre-departute to post arrival planning).
- Research on national resettlement programmes, integration, programmes receiving Syrians under resettlement and HAP.
- Tools and resources
- Awareness raising + campaigning on refugee situations / increased resettlement quotas (e.g Resettlement Saves Lives Campaign)

Private Sponsorship: Legal Entry

+ Integration support

- facilitates legal entry for refugees
- formal commitments between government and private actors
- financial, social and/or emotional support : pre-departure, reception and integration.

Channels, bundles and coordinates civil society engagement in Sponsorship offers an opportunity to directly engage with the resettlement process and, as a result, it builds **welcoming communities** and directly contributes to long-term integration efforts; it also provides an important opportunity to reframigration debate, generating public support for refugee



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Developments in Europe

- Humanitarian Corridors in Italy (1,000), France (500) –ongoing discussions in Belgium, Netherlands and Spain
- ° Private Sponsorship Programme in the United Kingdom (nrs not defined)
- Extended Family Reunification Programmes in Germany/Ireland (Lander Programme under the Residence Law)



New 'contract social' state and

- Builds upon welcoming initiatives that emerged since 2015potential to widen citizen support for refugee protection
- 1 out of 10 citizens willing to volunteer in Germany. Hundreds of initiatives across Europe.
- UK's 'Refugees Welcome' campaign and Aktion Neuer *Nachbar*, the New Neighbours Action in Cologne, Germany);
- Programs for private citizens to offer accommodation to refugees (i.e. Rifugiato a Casa Mia, A Refugee in my Home, in Italy Support for university students (i.e. Portugal's Global Platform for Syrian Students, and the University of Créteil's collaboration with the Association Démocratie et Entraide *Syrie* in France)

Making Sponsorships Work

We present four main recommendations with regard to the key features of a successful sponsorship programme:

- 1. roles, responsibilities and rights of sponsors, the government and sponsored persons should be clearly defined;
- sponsorship should complement and add to national resettlement quotas;
- 3. sponsorship initiatives should adopt a long-term perspective, and provide refugee status with a pathway to citizenship for sponsored persons;
- 4. sponsorship programmes should ensure a safety net is place should sponsors fail to meet their obligations






Complementary Pathways of Admission PRIVATE SPONSORSHIP OF REFUGEES

Humanitarian Corridors

- Developed by the Community of St. Egidio in Italy
- 1000 persons in Italy humanitarian visas- refugees and vulnerable migrants
- 500 in France- humanitarian visas —refugee status
- Focus on smaller communities –partnerships with chuches and religious organisiations.
- Opportunities to expand welcome across territory and engage new actors



Extended Family Reunification

- German Regional Admission Programmes
 (Landesaufnahmeprogramme), July 2013 December 2016.
- Entry to Germany was facilitated for approximately 22,000 persons.
- Administered separately by the German Länder (regions), based on section 68 of the German Residence Act, which allows individuals to sign a declaration of commitment (Verpflichtungserklärung) to 'sponsor' family members.
- The declaration obliged sponsors to account for all expenses linked to their relatives' travel and stay (including housing, income and social services) for five years. Sponsored persons were admitted on humanitarian grounds and offered a 2 renewable residence permit.

Slovakia Experience

- 149 Christian Iraqis came to Slovakia in 2015
- 550 Student Scholarships as of 2017
- How to define Sponsorships: Link with humanitarian Admission.
- Flexible concept: need to agree on benchmarks in the future!
