While its President Anote Tong races to find a way to protect his nation's people and maintain their dignity, many Kiribati are already seeking safe harbour overseas. The film was included in the Official Selection at several film festivals in 2018.

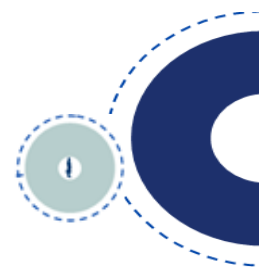
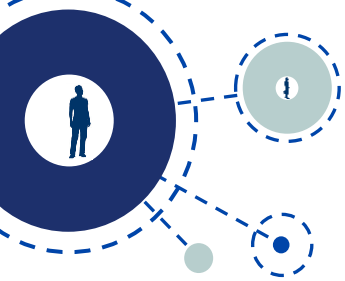
